REGARDING THE ALLOCATION OF TANNER CRAB IN THE BERING SEA

WHEREAS the best scientific information available has defined the <u>C. Bairdistock</u> of tanner crab in the Bering Sea as being primarily south of 58° North latitude and east of 173° West longitude; and

WHEREAS the best scientific information available has established that the total allowable catch of \underline{C} . Bairdi tanner crab is within the harvesting and processing capability of the United States fishing fleet; and

WHEREAS there exists a conflict of gear between foreign and domestic fisheries;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Alaska Board of Fisheries that no foreign harvest of tanner crab be allowed south of $58^{\rm O}$ North latitude and east of $173^{\rm O}$ West longitude.

WHEREAS the minimum legal carapace width of 140 mm for <u>C</u>. <u>Bairdi</u> tanner crab in the Bering Sea has been established by the Alaska Board of Fisheries as necessary for the conservation and continued productivity of the <u>C</u>. <u>Bairdi</u> tanner crab in Alaska; and

WHEREAS there is some evidence of a declining population in the Bering Sea tanner crab stock; and

WHEREAS P. L. 94-265 states that a stock of fish be managed as a unit throughout its range and that conservation and management measures shall not discriminate between residents of different states;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Alaska Board of Fisheries that any foreign fishery of <u>C</u>. <u>Bairdi</u> tanner crab be restricted to male crab greater than 140 mm of carapace width.
